IN THE GARDEN with Karen and Cheryl – dealing with squirrels

Yikes!!! What happened? After carefully choosing and preparing a combo of flowering plants in a pretty pot for the porch entrance, find that a great disturbance has occurred. Then, can actually see the culprit has returned, digging away and uprooting another pansy. Well known that squirrels relish acorns, but why dig up plants and in locations that never held any hidden food cache? May never know the answer to that question, but there may be ways to outwit the invaders.

Even though most of our encounters with squirrels are seeing them running and digging in the ground, the ones here in east Central Illinois are tree squirrels, the eastern grey type and do have their nesting sites in trees. Their favored food source are acorns and various types of seeds, especially sunflower seeds. Natural predators are owls and foxes, few of which exist in most neighborhoods.

Here are some suggestions for deterrence on our part:

From Southern Living: put up barriers to the soil such as chicken wire or small rocks.

From Better Homes & Gardens: use repellants such as cayenne pepper, peppermint oil or garlic -- though these do need to be refreshed regularly.

From Gardening Know How: use shiny objects: pinwheels, old CDs, or small aluminum pie pans that can distract and intimidate the invadersSquirrels do not like the taste of coffee grounds

Mixing used coffee grounds from your coffee pot with the top layer of soil is dual-purpose. Not only do squirrels strongly dislike the scent and taste of coffee grounds, but most plants get a nice boost of nutrients from it.

Plants love blood meal, which is often used to increase potting mixes' nutritional value. As a bonus, squirrels despise the smell if this as well.

Pack the planter pot with plants, for example using fragrant herbs (lavender, peppermint, spearmint) to fill in empty spaces. Tree squirrels have been reported to have preferences for bare soil and they avoid areas congested with tall grass. This technique has worked well for Karen. (But still working on how to keep the squirrels out of the general garden ...)

Use squirrel-proof bird feeders that can discourage squirrels from being habituated in your area.

For those interested in the chicken wire technique, did find a YouTube video that gave good advice about how to use the chicken wire to make cages plus how to use thorny rose cuttings for deterrence.
